### What to read

# Children and their problems at school

Children bring every imaginable human problem to school. Their parents and school staff bring adult versions of the same problems. Schools turn to school social workers for help with handling the problems, so that teachers can continue to teach and children learn. Systems based and holistic, school social work is a good match for the huge range of problems, making the school social worker a key school team member. The children's problems are both broad and deep, so a school social worker must have a huge range of knowledge and skills. It often seems to the social worker that she must quickly learn about a new topic every day. It then takes years to understand it at a deeper level.

#### School social work literature

School social workers, like any professional, continue to learn throughout their careers. Some take a higher degree, most use expert supervision and take continuing education classes, and they must read all they can about children, schools and how to apply knowledge to help schools. Finding relevant reading material is not easy, even when working with a school population that appears to be in mainstream western culture. It can be even harder to find literature that is suitable if you are working in a country where school social work has not produced texts that fit the culture.

School social work has a long history in the United States and texts have been available for decades, some with several editions, produced to respond to the emerging needs of the field. These texts typically offer the history of school social work, policy, theory and practice, all of which is important for the professional to know. For example, the 8th Edition of School Social Work and the 7<sup>th</sup> edition of Social Work Services in Schools both came out in 2015. Some authors to look for are Allen-Meares, Alvarez, Bye, Constable, Flynn, Franklin, Frey, Kelly, Massat, McDonald, Raines. Journals and guides help school social workers in the US to stay up-to-date. The *School Social Work Journal* has been published by the Illinois Association of School Social Workers since the late 1970's. Questia has a portal to articles in the School Social Work Journal with free previews <a href="https://www.questia.com/library/p439754/school-social-work-journal">https://www.questia.com/library/p439754/school-social-work-journal</a>. The National Association of Social Work publishes the journal *Children and Schools*.

There is extensive German language literature on Schulsozialarbeit and Sozialpädagogik, including works by Baier, Drilling, Nieslony, Rademacker, Speck, Vyslouzil. Sweden has an online quarterly magazine *Skolkuratorn* for all members of the Swedish School Social Workers Association and a 2005 textbook *Socionomen i skolan* (The Social Worker in the School) by Yvonne D. Wester.

Professor Min-Sun Sung of the Catholic University of Korea, founding President of KSSSW (The Korean Society of School Social Work), and several colleagues have translated Allen-Meares 5<sup>th</sup> Edition of *Social Work Services in Schools* into Korean and published it in February 2008.

The School Social Workers Association of Mongolia has published the journal *Mongolia School Social Work Practice* four times a year. The Association also has research reports and publications that have advanced the progress of the field, such as the *Situation Analysis on School Social Work in Mongolia*, Summary of a Research Report (2007), which unfortunately no longer seems available online

In Japan, Yamashita, Kadota, Hanba, Uchida, Noriko Yamano and others pioneered school social work literature and there have been around 10 books published in just the last few years, The *Japanese Journal of School Social Work*, started in 2006, continues to publish an edition annually.
